

Detection of *M. gen* requires nucleic acid amplification testing (NAAT).¹

M. gen is a STI that has a **similar clinical presentation** to chlamydia, gonorrhea, and trichomoniasis.¹⁻³

- Symptomatic testing is recommended today.¹
- and men, such as cervicitis and urethritis.⁴
- M. gen can be difficult to detect because of low bacterial organism load compared to other commonly tested STIs.⁵
- Difficult detection requires a highly sensitive rRNA test needed for accurate diagnosis.⁵
