


Examples of Congenital Syphilis and Other STI Media Campaign Materials





ANNOUNCER (30 sec): Syphilis is on the rise in Virginia. Part of the reason why...is that it's hard to notice. It usually starts with a sore or a rash – but sometimes, the only way to tell if you have syphilis is to get tested. So call the Virginia Department of Health -- they can tell you where to go for free, confidential testing. Because if you don't get it treated, syphilis can really hurt you. ANNOUNCER (60 sec): Syphilis is really on the rise in Virginia. And if you're sexually active and don't get tested every couple of months, there's a possibility that you might have it and you might not even know it until it does some real damage to your body. See, syphilis usually starts with a sore or a rash. But sometimes, you can have it and not notice the symptoms. And if you have syphilis and you don't get it treated, you could end up with serious health problems. It could damage your heart, your liver, your bones, your brain, your vision -- or even worse. The good news is, if you get tested, and you catch it early, syphilis is easy to cure. So call the Virginia Department of Health at 1-800-533-4148. They'll tell you where to go for free, confidential syphilis testing. Because when it comes to syphilis, you want to be sure. And if you do have it, you want to be cured. Answer

- Sexually transmitted disease (STD).
- Syphilis is a skin and blood infection caused by a bacteria (Treponema pallidum)
- It can spread to other parts of the body after it enters the blood, including organs.

Everything You Need to Know





- · Discuss detailed sexual history and STD testing with ALL pregnant patients.
- Know key signs and symptoms to look for:

Stage	Onset	Characteristics
Primary	2-3 weeks after infection	Painless chancre (lesion or sore)
Secondary	4-10 weeks after chancre	 Diffuse body or palmar- plantar skin rash Flat mucous patches Elevated condylomata lata (warty plaques)
Early Latent	<1 year after infection	 Serological proof BUT asymptomatic (early, non-primary, non-secondary)
Late Latent	>1 year after infection	 Serological proof BUT asymptomatic (late or unknown duration)
Tertiary	2-50 years after infection	 Tumor-like gumma (necrotic granuloma) Cardio, neuro, and ocular complications





Screen ALL pregnant patients at initial prenatal visit, during 3rd trimester at 28 to 32 weeks gestation, AND at labor and delivery.





- · Administer Benzathine Penicillin 2.4 million units IM at 5-7 Day Intervals immediately.
- · Every week for 2 weeks for primary, secondary, or early latent, non-primary, nonsecondary
- · Every week for 3 weeks for late latent or unknown duration
- Ensure ALL positive pregnant patients are treated at least 30 days prior to delivery.
- Refer patient's partner(s) for treatment.

PROTECT YOURSELF AND YOUR BABY FROM SYPHILIS.

Syphilis is a sexually transmitted infection.

It can be cured with medicine. If not treated, it can cause problems with your eyes, heart and brain. It can cause serious problems for your baby, like:



- Being born too early
- Being born too small
- Death before or after birth
- Lifelong problems with eyes, ears, teeth, bones and joints

Here's what you can do:


Use a condom when you have sex. Condoms can help prevent you and your partner from getting or spreading syphilis.




If you're pregnant, **go to all your prenatal checkups**. Ask about syphilis testing.










STDS are sexually transmitted diseases.

Could you have one?

25 years old or younger? 15-24 AGE GROUP:

27% of the sexually-active population.

50% of the 20,000,000 new STDs cases each year.

Many have multiple partners—increases risk.

Not open to talking about their sexual behaviors with their doctors.

Condom use?

Consistent, correct use reduces risk.

MORE RELIABLE:

Long-term, mutually monogamous relationship with an uninfected partner.

Not having sex.

STDs: more long-term health problems for women than men.

Undiagnosed STDs cause 24,000 women to become infertile each year.

Women don't know they're infected because they have few or no symptoms.

YOUNGER WOMEN:

More biologically susceptible to STDs.

Many don't receive chlamydia screenings.

FOR WOMEN, SYMPTOMS ARE HARDER TO SEE AND FEEL.

Sores from herpes or syphilis can be inside the vagina. A man can see and be bothered by sores on his penis.

A WOMAN CAN THINK AN STD SYMPTOM IS SOMETHING ELSE. For a woman, discharge, burning and itching can mean something as normal as a yeast infection.

STDs can lead to serious, life-long health problems for a woman: MISCARRIAGE, INFERTILITY AND ECTOPIC PREGNANCY.

HUMAN PAPILLOMAVIRUS (HPV) IS THE MOST COMMON STD IN WOMEN AND THE MAIN CAUSE OF CERVICAL CANCER.



Syphilis can cause congenital syphilis (CS) in an infant. CS can cause low-birth weight, brain damage, blindness, deafness or death.

For infants, gonorrhea can cause infections that lead to blindness—chlamydia can cause eye and lung infections.

A mother with HIV can deliver an infant with HIV who will need to be treated. A mother under treatment for HIV can stop the spread of infection to her infant.

A mother with hepatitis B can deliver an infant with hepatitis B. About 1 out of 4 infants with the disease will die of liver failure or liver cancer as adults.

If you're pregnant, get tested for STDs the first time you see your doctor or midwife—STDs like syphilis do not have symptoms.

STOs (sexually transmitted diseases) can cause life-changing problems for women and their bables. Congenital syphilis, or CS, is a disease that happens when a pregnant woman with syphilis passes the infection onto her baby.

CS can cause miscarriage and still birth, or cause a baby to die soon after birth. It causes complications like prematurity or low-birth weight.

Even newborns with CS who look healthy need treatment and care. Infections, setzures, deformed bones, anemia, enlarged liver and spieen, jaundice, blindness and deafness can appear in the first few weeks after birth, while problems like delays in development can happen years later.

Help yourself Help your baby. Get tested.

Up to 40% of babies born to women with untreated syphilis may be stillborn or die from the infection as a newborn. (CDC)






